

Mid-South District Convention

The Mid-South District Convention of the Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod will be held June 12 to 14 here in Memphis. The opening communion service will be held on Friday night, 7:30 p.m. at Christ the King Lutheran Church, 5296 Park Avenue in east Memphis. Over 500 are expected to attend. All are invited, including members of area LCMS congregations. It promises to be a most thrilling worship experience. I hope you can join us!

Convention sessions on Saturday and Sunday will be held at the Memphis Marriott Hotel on Thousand Oaks Blvd. in east Memphis. One of the main items on the agenda is the election of officers. Rev. Ken Lampe is up for a third term as district president. At least two new vice presidents will be elected, including a pastor to take my position. I will be retiring as first vice president at this convention, having served my two terms. It has been a great privilege for the past six years to serve our Lord and our Mid-South District in this capacity.

The *Fan into Flame* campaign will be officially kicked off at the Saturday session of the convention. Trinity congregation is one

raise 100 million dollars to support mission work in the LCMS' 6,000+ congregations, 35 districts, North American missions and world missions. Over 47 million has already been raised nationally. For Trinity, that is \$28,000. Over \$21,000 has already been pledged by a dozen members. I have been asked by the convention committee to preach at the 8:00 a.m. Sunday worship service. This will be my final service to our district as first vice president. I count this as a great honor and privilege, to bring the Good News of Jesus to the 250+ delegates and guests at the convention.

Please pray that God will bless all that is done and acted upon at the convention that it will glorify the name of Jesus and extend His kingdom of truth and love.

“www.connected.john15”

I’ve not had much interest in computers - got along without one for years. I’d play with it from time to time, but then get frustrated at the machine and lose interest.

But things change. When I became “supply” pastor in Jackson, it became clear that I was not “with the program.” The Lutheran circuit clergy communicate almost totally via e-mail, and Concordia, Jackson, too, is very much e-mail connected. So without the computer, I was outside the loop. The computer is helpful at home, too. In looking for a new car, I found that the old way (newspaper) was out of date, and used the new way of the internet. It’s a good way to order things for my shop, as well. So I’m gradually coming around to using a computer.

It was my turn to preach on Mother’s Day, and when I sent the title- www.connected.john15- to the secretary in Jackson, she wrote back to make sure she’d read it correctly. I responded, “Yes. Read John 15 and you’ll understand.” The gospel for the day - Jesus story of the vine and branches - was easy to connect to Mom’s role of nurturer.

Jesus used this analogy of vine and branches just before his crucifixion, assuring the disciples once more that he would not leave them orphaned or “motherless;” connected to Him, like the vine to the branch, they could produce fruit.

Both my grandparents had vineyards, as does my brother Glenn in Seattle. The vines attached to the branch look like arms outstretched. That made me think of how we are connected not only to Christ, but to one another, too. We are in a community -the Church - connected to fellow disciples who nurture and sustain us.

A good thing about the computer is its ability to keep us connected. Dick, a homebound person in Jackson, spends hours on his, keeping up with the needs of others. Without my computer connection, I was withering, like a branch cut off from the vine. We are thankful for the Savior who - long before the computer - has not left us as orphans, but keeps us connected as the Body of Christ to that nourishing Vine, Jesus himself.

Favorite Hymns

My friend’s father was recently diagnosed with a terminal illness. Katherine sent out a request to her pals via e-mail: “Do you have any CDs of hymns? Not choir anthems, but just good, familiar hymns. It would be a big help to us right now.”

Hymns have been credited with expressing “the theology of the people.” They express the profound truths of the Church in ways we can easily understand. They assure us of God’s abiding presence and love. When we are so overwhelmed we have no words of our own, the poetry and music of hymns help us identify and express our deepest emotions.

We all have our favorite hymns that we would like to sing more often. This summer we will devote a few minutes before each worship service to singing a few of our favorite hymns. Use the insert in the bulletin to note the ones you like best. We’ll compile the results and sing two or three at the beginning of our June, July, and August worship services.

For practicality, we ask that you limit your choices to hymns in *Lutheran Service Book* or *With One Voice*. Otherwise, pick what you will. Don’t worry about a hymn being out of season or less familiar - if you like it, write it down. The form has room to list 10 hymns. If you can only think of one or two hymns, list them. If you want to squeeze in a few extra, do so. *Lutheran Service Book* includes some hymns that weren’t in our previous hymnal, so look through it carefully. The index of “First Lines,” beginning on page 1017, can be helpful; or just thumb through the pages.

I talked to my friend last night and she said her family has received 38 CD’s! These hymns are providing comfort, recalling memories of a lifetime, and bringing them joy and assurance of Christ’s abiding love. Let’s share our favorite

hymns with each other this summer!

In other business, the Council approved a motion to replace one of the two large compressors for the fellowship hall air conditioning system, and to do some needed repair work and painting on the church steeple.

Parish Nurse Notes

The term “domestic violence” most often refers to a situation in which one partner or spouse uses physical, mental, and/or emotional abuse and coercive acts to gain control and power over the other. Only recently has domestic violence been recognized as a major public health issue. It is estimated that 25% of pregnant women nationwide are victims of abuse. Domestic abuse is one of the contributing factors in the high infant mortality rate in Memphis and Shelby County.

In 2007, Memphis and Shelby County law enforcement agencies responded to over 63,000 domestic abuse violence calls. Local law enforcement investigated 24,000 of these calls, with 4,014 ending in prosecution. Domestic violence accounts for 52% of all crimes against person in Memphis and Shelby County. Recent statistics report a decline in all other crimes except domestic abuse.

Victims of domestic abuse come from all races, religions and socio-economic backgrounds. The effects of being a victim of abuse can be long-lasting. Victims may suffer from depression, anxiety attacks, low self-esteem, lack of trust in others and God, feelings of abandonment, anger, chronic health problems, sleeping problems, inability to bond in relationships, and substance abuse. Children who witness or are victims of domestic abuse often develop serious emotional, behavioral, developmental or academic problems. Children who grow up with domestic violence are more likely to attempt suicide, abuse drugs and become abusers later in life.

In addition to having to cope with these physical, emotional and spiritual effects, victims of abuse also face the crushing reality that the resources to help them escape their abusive relationship are few and fragmented. In Memphis and Shelby County there is only one emergency shelter, with a mere 27 beds for abused women and their children. Safe and affordable long term housing is also difficult to find, as is legal assistance.

In an effort to help victims of abuse establish a safe environment for themselves and their families, the Circle of Inspiration Outreach Program offers practical and spiritual support. The Circle of Inspiration started in 2001 as an outreach program at Inspirational Faith Lutheran Church. At the core of the services provided is a faith-centered support group for female victims of domestic abuse that meets semi-monthly. This group is the only faith-centered support group in the Memphis area.

The Circle of Inspiration also provides short-term individual crisis counseling, as well as social service case management for needed resources such as food, clothing, medicine, housing, utilities, rent, and legal assistance. Individual safety planning is also provided.

The Circle is supported through small grants and the generous donations of individuals. The following is a list of ways in which you can help the Circle of Inspiration continue to provide this ministry:

- * Pray for the director, Vernetta Eddleman, and volunteers;
- * Pray for the victims and their families;
- * Pray for the development of more emergency housing and services for victims;
- * Donate household items: laundry detergent, cleaning supplies, kitchen item (pots, pans, microwave ovens, cutlery, dinnerware), bed linens and blankets, mops, brooms, light bulbs, etc.;
- * Donate personal items: (new)adult and children’s underwear and socks, deodorant, soap, sanitary napkins, toothbrush and toothpaste, mouthwash, combs, brushes, diapers, wipes, washcloths and towels, etc.;
- * Give assistance with minor car repairs, lock changes;
- * Deliver furniture items;
- * Provide gas cards, grocery gift cards;
- * Provide childcare for support group.
